


Main Sources of Funding

- Private Sector Funding & Trusts



Setting Up A non profit to get funding



- 1. First steps to set up a Health & Wellbeing Project- decide how to do it
- 2. What is the appropriate structure to develop it? Non-profit making company- CLG or CIC, community group, social enterprise or other structure

- 3. Access Funding for Wellbeing Projects you can then access charitable grants, Crowdfunding, Lottery funding, private sector funding, income generation and others
- 4. You may need advice from an accountant or solicitor depending on circumstances- CNT offer business development advice not legal advice

London Catalyst -

London Catalyst support project that address the unmet health needs of Londoners, especially focusing on those from disadvantaged communities.

They offer 3 types of grant, one is below

PROJECT GRANTS support new initiatives and service developments targeted at people disadvantaged as a result of long term ill-health, disability and poverty.

Grants range from £1,000 to £5,000; the average in 2019 was £3,000.

Occasionally trustees will consider a larger grant for projects which are 'catalytic' and likely to demonstrate impact.

Community Business Fund

Community businesses will be able to apply for grants of between £10,000 and £20,000 to adapt and evolve to the changing circumstances; and to remain financially viable.

Funding for Women Led Projects

Enterprise Nation Female Start Up of the Year

The applicant's start-up must be a UK based company with no more than 10 employees that has been trading for up to three years.

Previous prizes have included:

- £500 Facebook advertising credit
- Quarterly business mentoring for a year from KPMG
- Power your business with Square' which includes a Square reader and Dock (worth £58+VAT) plus £1,000 worth of free processing
- A one hour consultation and lunch with Clive Lewis, head of enterprise at ICAEW, and a £100 voucher to spend at PC World
- The title of Enterprise Nation Female Start-up of the Year

Global Fund for Women

Global Fund for Women

The Global Fund for Women aims to support organisations – led by girls, women or trans people – which are making changes to advance gender equality and human rights in their communities.

Awards

Flexible cash grants which support with operating and programme expenses, and/or grants to help with travel and event organising.

Entry Criteria

Your organisation must be:

- Based outside the US
- Dedicated to improving women's equality and/or human rights
- Governed by a group of women, girls or trans people (Global Fund for Women awards grants to groups, not individuals)

Delivered by Rosa and Smallwood Trust, the Women Thrive Fund is distributing grants of up to £40,000 to specialist women's organisations across the UK. – CHECK SITE FOR LATEST DETAILS

Organisations should be working to enable women and girls to improve their mental health and wellbeing and/or improve their financial resilience.

The fund responds directly to what women's and girls' organisations have told us throughout the pandemic: that declining mental health, increased risk of emotional trauma and increased poverty levels are their biggest concerns for women and girls across the UK.


Entry Criteria

Organisations can apply for:

- •Grants of up to £15,000 with a turnover of £200,000 inclusive
- •Grants of up to £40,000 with a turnover of £200,001 £999,999.

They can also apply for an additional 25% of their grant request for work which will strengthen their organisation.

Small Wood Trust



Funding for BAME led women's projects –EXAMPLE from November 2020

Grants of between £20,000 and £30,000 are available to charities, social enterprises and other not-for-profit organisations that are supporting women who are experiencing poverty and low income as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Women's Sector Resilience Fund is open to organisations across England with an income of less than £1 million per annum; and will provide grants to cover costs including staff salaries, running costs/overheads, project costs, and goods and equipment to support the adaptation of frontline services to meet the challenges of the Covid-19 crisis.

Priority will be given to organisations supporting and led by BAME women, women with disabilities and financially vulnerable LGBT+ women.

Funding will be prioritised for women's sector organisations and services where the pandemic has had the most impact including:

Approximately £4 billion per year in grants given.

The UK's largest pharmaceutical company and also the largest charitable grant funder in the UK - over £700 million per year distributed.

Public Engagement Fund

Funding for organisations, companies and individuals in any sector who have the ability to engage the general public through health-related research and science, throughout the UK- this can be illustrated using any creative methodology- i.e. film, art, digital media, drama, animation etc.

Grants range from £5,000 to £3,000,000

Crowdfunding

- Crowdfunding is a new concept based on working with specific communities, organisations and individuals to directly fund projects
- You pledge money as an individual or organisation
- When the total is reached it is usually time limited, the pledgers have to pay, platform takes between 4-9% of what is raised - other terms though can be negotiated on some sites
- What is key to this communities of influence or common bonds
- Driving traffic to the pledger website
- You can pledge large or small amounts of money

Potential Wellbeing Funding Sources

The Hollyhock Charitable Foundation

Awards grants to charitable organisations within the UK. The trustees have a particular focus on supporting organisations who:

- prevent or relieve poverty worldwide for individuals in need
- •advance the health and wellbeing of the general public (including preventing or relieving sickness, disease or suffering, as well as the promotion of good health)
- •support programmes which promote and advance the education of the general public

The Foundation has a fund of £1 million for grants

No minimum or maximum grant size is specified.

The Foundation does not operate a website, but more information, including their annual reports, can be found on the Charity Commission's register of charities.



Successful organisations will receive the total funds that they requested in their application.

Awards For All


You can get a grant of up to £10,000 – turnover of up to £50k to be eligible.

You can get grants for training, events, sports and cultural activities, heritage projects - if you have to apply to partner organisations such as Sport England for sports projects, Heritage Lottery for Heritage projects & Arts Council for Arts.

A large Trust which funds projects in the following areas:


- Cultural activities
